The season of Lent begins February 14. This year's theme is "Book of Faith" and the St. Barnabas community will encounter the Bible in three ways as part of our Lenten discipline.

### Lent Devotional Book

A daily devotional book for the 40 days of Lent is being written by members of the St. Barnabas community and will be distributed at worship on February 11. Writers are taking a favorite passage or story and reflecting on why this passage has been important in their lives. Each week of Lent will have a Bible verse suggested for the community to commit to memory.

### Lent Small Groups

Many people have the tradition of "giving up" something for Lent — perhaps chocolate or alcohol or watching TV. The purpose behind that tradition is to identify with Christ, who gave himself up on our behalf on the cross.

But there is an alternate tradition of "taking something on" for the season of Lent. One of the "salutary" (promoting health and wholeness) purposes of the season of Lent is to nurture our faith — to cultivate and fertilize it so it will continue to grow. This Lent, the St. Barnabas community invites you to "add on" the activity of participating in a 5-week small group discussion on our theme of "Bible: Book of Faith."

### The "Double Benefit" of Small Groups

Participating in a small group discussion is not only beneficial for one's personal spiritual health. It has the added benefit of fostering friendships and strengthening the community. If you are relatively new to the community or have been trying to find a connecting point with others, these small groups are especially for you!

Our Lenten small groups will use a video/discussion format, so there is minimal preparation required of the participants. The materials are called "Animate" and are produced by Sparkhouse. Some of today's best-known church leaders (like Nadia Bolz-Weber, Rachel Held-Evans, William Willimon, and Phyllis Tickle) help us explore questions like:

### Ash Wednesday

The St. Barnabas community begins the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday services at noon and 6:15 p.m. on February 14.



There are no Wednesday Night Lighthouse classes on Ash Wednesday. **All ages — Sailors, Mariners, and Navigators — are to worship with their parents. 9th graders and their mentors are to worship together.**

A simple meal of soup and bread will be provided, served after the noon service and before (5:15-6:10) the 6:15 p.m. worship. The suggested donation is \$2 per person.

The five Wednesdays following Ash Wednesday (February 21—March 21) also offer two worship opportunities at noon and 6:15, but the evening schedule is different.

**Wednesday Night Lighthouse DOES meet each of these Wednesdays at the usual time of 6:00.** Navigators (grades 6-8) and Mariners (grades 3-5) meet as a group from 6:00-6:15, then attend worship. **Sailors** (age 3-grade 2) have their regular schedule, meeting from 6-7:00.

The evening worship uses Marty Haugen's setting of Holden Evening Prayer. Members of the congregation will share aspects of their faith journeys.

## Lutheran Social Service is February “Gift of Love”

Since 1865, Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota has responded to Minnesota's changing needs by being wholly committed to making life better for our citizens.

Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota traces its history to 1865 when Vasa Lutheran Church (near Red Wing) opened its church to care for four children in need. Pastor Eric Norelius (who three years earlier had started an academy that became Gustavus Adolphus College) came up with a community response that inspired hope and changed the life of the community.

Lutheran Social Service is one of Minnesota's largest statewide, non-profit charitable organizations, with an annual budget of \$98 million funded from public, private and charitable sources. Its 2,300 staff serve nearly 100,000 people of all ages in each of Minnesota's 87 counties and in more than 300 communities. 88% of all funding goes directly to serve people in need. ### ADOPTION

LSS provides adoption studies, child placement, post placement services, pregnancy counseling and post adoption services.

### COUNSELING

LSS provides a wide variety of counseling services that address emotional and relationship problems associated with childhood and youth. These counseling services bridge the years from the very young all the way through adolescence.

### CRISIS NURSERY

Crisis Nursery is a confidential service offering short-term, safe care for children from infancy through 12 years of age. The service is provided for families who are experiencing significant levels of stress which may lead to the abuse or neglect of their child.

### DEBT/FINANCIAL COUNSELING

Certified professionals help people restructure debt and payment plans as well as offer hands-on suggestions related to budgeting and establishing sound money-management practices. Offices in 20 locations statewide.

### FOSTER GRANDPARENTS

Volunteer grandparents befriend young children in their day care centers, schools, correctional facilities and battered women's shelters to offer a caring presence and a positive adult role model. For information, call toll free at 1.888.205.3770.

### HOUSING/SHELTERS

Adults and families sometimes experience difficulty in finding secure and permanent housing. LSS offers a number of housing programs that help people find appropriate living situations. Children and Youth are sometimes unable to live with their parents. In cases like this, LSS operates crisis nurseries for small children plus emergency shelters and group homes for trouble teens.

### REFUGEE & EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

LSS employs a racially- and culturally-diverse staff to assist refugees who are fleeing poverty and political harassment in Africa and Eastern European countries. These services include citizenship preparation, housing, employment and cultural adjustment.

### SAFE HOUSE

The Safe House, a shelter for homeless youth ages 16-20, is located in the Merriam Park neighborhood of St. Paul.

### WELFARE TO WORK

Through employment training and counseling, LSS helps long-term welfare recipients transition to lives characterized by employment and self-reliance.
